

Flip Book

What You Need

- small pad of paper (If you don't have a pad, cut paper into same-size pieces and staple the pieces along one edge.)
- tape
- markers or crayons

- 1 Wrap tape around the top of the pad so the pages won't fall out when you flip them.
- 2 On the last page of the pad, draw your first picture. (For example, if you want to make a face change from frowning to smiling, draw a smiling face on the last page.)
- 3 Trace the parts of the picture that won't change. (For example, trace the outline of the face, hair, eyes, and nose.)
- 4 Starting from the last page, draw the part of the picture that will change, but draw it a little bit differently on each page. (For example, slowly make the corners of the mouth point down until you have a frown on the first page.)

- 5 Flip the pages of the book and watch the pictures change.
